Remembrance Day




On Friday 11th November we were grateful to be able to attend a Remembrance service led by Rev Tracey James and Rev Susan Taylor at St Mary Magdalene. Our Senior Prefects gave readings and we reflected upon those lost in conflict. Names were read from the Debenham War Memorial and names were also included of those known to us, allowing us time to pause and reflect and remember sacrifices made for us.

In school our Year 8 and Year 9 students created a range of memorial poppies in their AD&T lessons in September. We collated their work in plastic, material, card, paper and salt dough to create memorials for remembrance around the school.

In the preceding weeks students enjoyed making lanterns and learning two traditional German songs in readiness for the event. On arrival each year 7 student was presented with a Lebkuchen goose to share, just as Saint Martin shared his belongings.

Once in the hall we practised our songs, expertly accompanied on the violin and squeeze-box by Christine and Paul Keeler who travelled from Norwich especially for the occasion. Full audience participation was encouraged and , in particular, the chorus of "rabimmel, rabammel, rabumm" caused much laughter!

We were then treated to a fabulous re-enactment of Saint Martin's encounter with the poor beggar, performed by the year 12 German A' level class from Abbeygate Sixth Form College in Bury St Edmunds.



Again, the audience joined in heartily with cries of "Martin ist ein guter Mann".

Following this we processed around the school site in the darkness, illuminated by our lanterns and singing en route.

Once back in the hall we enjoyed a buffet of German specialties provided by parents and carers and chatted with friends before making our way home.

It was lovely to see so many families enjoying themselves together at school. Parents loved it, students loved it, teachers loved it. Mr Martin said, "Let's make it an annual event." So, it's in the

diary for 2023 and we can't wait to do it all again with next year's year 7!

Nastya, one of our Ukrainian students who joined our school in June last year, in Year 9, has been an avid badminton player and formidable athlete all of her life, initially taking inspiration from her father, to date she has seven years' experience under her belt but constantly strives to adapt and improve her gameplay. She highlighted the difficulty of trying to maintain her lead when her opponents are working to try and catch up to her, when this happens she takes time to think and evaluate her gameplay before returning to the match with a fresh perspective. She is clearly able to overcome these challenges and is ranked first in Ukraine doubles for her age category and second in mixed doubles and singles. Despite all of this, Nastya does not play for medals or glory and does not care about her rank. She is enthralled with the badminton and looks up to the Chinese professional badminton players, it is her dream to one day be like them and compete at the Olympics. As well as this, she wants to one day pass her expertise on to the next generation of badminton players and become a coach.



Nastya faced some difficulties with badminton in Ukraine from both coaches and fellow players but since coming to England her love for the sport has grown exponentially. England's badminton is both fun and rigorous, developing her gameplay. She has enjoyed

taking part in the badminton club in school but she has also joined one out of school. Nastya and her teammates have already bonded, partly through their five training sessions a week and competition every weekend but also their shared passion of badminton. So far her highlights of badminton in England have been an exhausting yet excellent training camp in Milton Keynes where she had three two hour badminton development training sessions for a week whilst training in a state of the art badminton performance centre.

Her competitions have been going extremely well with Nastya already being ranked sixth in the UK despite only being here for a short time. In order to challenge Nastya she often plays with people above her age, particularly in the under 19s category. She loves her team in England but prefers singles to double as she believes it is more individual so therefore more tactical, which is where

she excels.

Looking to the future, Nastya is eagerly anticipating a huge Estonia under 15s competition January where she will be able to display what she has learned in England and play against some of the best young, up and coming badminton players in the world. Nastya undoubtedly has a very bright future within badminton and at Debenham High School we can't wait to see what she does next.










ADT Trip to Paris



Liv and Emma write, we have been at the school for seven weeks as part of our Bachelor's in Education in Denmark. In the beginning we did some observations in different classes and later, we went on to teach in English. It has been an experience we will never forget, and we are very grateful to have been given the opportunity to get the know the wonderful students at the school.

It's been interesting getting to know the English education system, as it differs from the Danish one quite a bit; in Denmark, we don't divide the students into ability sets, every class is mixed ability. We find that dividing the pupils into sets makes it easier to help the students at their level, and to make sure that you

can challenge them when they need it.

Teaching at Debenham High has shown us what being passionate about your job means. All the teachers at the school show an interest in their pupils, and it is obvious to us that they all care about educating the students, not only by making them smarter, but also teaching them how to be kind and respectful towards others.



National UKMars Robotics --




Year 8 students have been attending robotics buggy club each week in the DT department since the autumn term. During this time they have assembled and programmed their own robotic buggies using Raspberry Pi Pico chips. They have been working towards becoming the fastest Drag racer, line follower or Maze solving buggies.


Once they had built the buggies they had to write their own code to ensure it performed the selected tasks and met the guidance for the competition. For instance all buggies have to start the race automatically and compete unaided and stop within the designated area at the end of the run. This has to be attempted in the fastest time possible but the faster the buggy moves the more unstable it can become on the track. Following weeks of developing and testing their coding programming we had 2 students who had produced competition ready buggies.

They competed against other juniors from across the country in a range of disciplines. The day involved them having to practice on new tracks, develop and adjust coding for their robots and compete in competitions.



We are pleased to say that Alex won the fastest line following Robot for both the long track and short track. Evlyn came first in the fastest Drag racing robot with Alex coming in second place. These are superb results as it has taken a lot of hard work and programming skills to be able to produce a robotic buggy that can not only successfully complete the tasks let alone be competitive and win the events.



A huge thank you to Mr Clapson and Mr Fisher who have supported the students both in person and virtually and attended the competition with them on the day. This has been a very rewarding and valuable experience for all involved.



Polyglot Club







The day started with a lecture on 'Promoting Global Change through Technology'. The talk explored how future technologies might empower people to improve their lives, bringing about global change, one person at a time.





Students also had the chance to chat with some of the companies who are involved in developing these new technologies.

The second lecture was more interactive and our students particularly enjoyed the encryption challenge. They learnt about some of the different ciphers for GCSE and this enabled them to increase their understanding as to how other methods impact password strength and decryption time.





MFL Christmas Card Competition

DHS cultural explorers have researched other lands and enriched us with their festive findings! 39 students submitted 42 Christmas cards representing the languages of 28 different nations.




Music Making in the Local Community


In celebration of the return of the Book Fair, students were given the opportunity to win free book vouchers for the Fair.
